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Own the stage

Have you ever wondered what the difference is between a sensational speaker, and someone who wins the International Speech Contest? Often, it is specific techniques that are used that appear to make the presenter own the stage. Three specific techniques can be used to greatly enhance any presentation.

CREATING A TIME LINE

We have been taught from a very young age to read from left to right. As such, we internally process that the past occurs at the left of the stage, moving through the present in the middle, and progressing to the future on the right of the stage. How can you use this to your advantage – by moving with a purpose. For example - to have a greater impact on your audience, move to the left hand side of the speaking area to tell that story that occurs in the past. (Of course, don't forget that this is the left hand side for the audience – not the speaker!). This, for example, could be the start of your Toastmasters career. When you wanted to explain where your journey has taken you currently, move to the centre. Then, when you describe exactly where you want to be in the future – move to the right hand side of the stage.

What you have done is create a far stronger message than just with the words that you have used. The audience has intuitively connected with the timeline as you incorporated the movement as well as the words of your story. CREATING A HOLOGRAM

This is another useful technique that can be used to great advantage when referring back to a story that you have told. Once you have told a story at a particular place on the stage – it is as if the story occurred at that precise point. A hologram has been created. It is then possible to physically refer back to the story by using both a visual and verbal call back to that point on the stage. Perhaps at the conclusion of your speech you wanted to refer back to the start of your Toastmaster journey – it is a powerful reference to point back to the position on the stage where that story was told.

This creates a powerful reminder – as it includes both visual and verbal reference to the story that was told previously.

STEPING OUT OF YOUR STORY

Another technique that can be used to create impact, is to step outside of your story. If, for example you were reciting a dialogue between characters, you could take a step forward to make a sideline comment, and then step backwards and continue the dialogue.

Used effectively, this shows a strong control of stage usage, and confidence.

I encourage you to try these techniques as the opportunity arises. As you become more confident your state techniques will greatly enhance your presentations, and your connection with the audience.
