In the Evaluation Contest we were represented by Alicia Denis, with Wendy Neilsen and Sam Ekinci representing Western Gourmet and Winners Circle respectively. Bryon Jones and Gwenda Lister represented Parrachievers and Orica Villawood in both contests. I cannot tell you how proud I was of our three members - in my opinion each of them produced their best ever evaluation, and each would have certainly been well in front of the competition in many other area contests. Alicia emerged as the judges' choice with an extremely smooth and well balanced performance - she's learned some wonderful new skills in the last couple of months and these produced a highly empathetic result. Both she and Juliet Lara of Winners Circle had powerful, emotional subjects and did them justice in front of an enthusiastic audience. Juliet took home second place while I managed to put enough polish on my speech to take the prize. Many thanks to the members who gave me feedback on Thursday night – those who were at the contest will have noticed how well many of the ideas worked out for me!

So the end result was that Parramatta TM has won both of the Area 13 contests! This is Alicia's first win at the Area level (in fact I think it may be 1 win from 1 attempt!), and Wendy's second place in the Evaluation is certainly a best ever result for her! 
