'Opportunity Knocks', is a topic that everyone can relate to. In tonight's meeting, we heard how people grabbed their opportunities – in Toastmasters and in their everyday life. There were some great stories.

Our meeting began on time as **Rudolph Wirawan** immediately put the night's theme into practice. With our regular SAA away, he took the opportunity at short notice to stand in as our SAA. Being his first time in the position, he did an excellent job.

Alicia Denis, our President, opened our meeting, taking the opportunity to mention the winners of the Area 13 Contests and Western Division Contests -Tom **Cummins** (International) representing Parramatta Toastmasters and Wendy Nielsen (Evaluation) representing Parramatta Pioneers. Plus club member David Griffiths who, in a different division, won both the speech and evaluation contests. Congratulations to all.

Chairman 1, John New, told the story of how he took up a job opportunity. At one time he worked for a large stable IT company but was head-hunted to work for a small software startup. It was a one-time-only job offer with high risks but potential for high rewards. It worked out for 9 years until the high-tech bubble burst, whereupon he needed to seek other opportunities.

Kumi Matsunobu welcomed our visitors, including a group of Speechcraft graduates and a visitor from another Toastmasters club.

This evening we also had a new member induction. Alicia Denis invited new member, David Gane, and mentor, John New, to the front as we welcomed David into the club.



In his point of view, John Taylor explained how a tap on the shoulder from Gary Wilson kick-started his Toastmasters leadership track. He began as SAA at club level and then took on other club roles such as VPE and President. But it didn't stop there. He continued as Area Governor, Division Governor, and Annual Conference Chairman, to name just a few. His point? Don't wait to take up those roles!

little better as Linda Said asked him a series of penetrating "get to know you" questions. Such as: What was your first impression of Toastmasters? It was good, not as scary as he thought it would be. Has Toastmasters helped you? Yes, it helped him to become more articulate. It's always nice to learn a bit more about our club members.

Andrew Iverson's inspirational revolved around music. He mentioned some classic songs such as "Cats in the Cradle" by Harry Chapin and "Imagine" by John Lennon. He explained how music, with its rhythm, melody, and harmony can evoke power, passion, tears, and humour – finishing with his own humorous rendition by singing as Elmer Fudd!

Our Blog Evaluator tonight was **Michael** Said. Trying something different, he didn't ask who had read the latest blog. Instead he had printed the blog and handed it out. The blog, by **Melanie** Wilson, was titled "Have Your Say" and it explained how the blog was now to be opened up to all club members who had something to say. As she said in her well-written piece: feel free to get creative.

Tonight's toast by **Tom** Woods was to Mary Donaldson. If that name

doesn't ring a bell, she is now better known as Mary, Crown Princess of Denmark, married to Frederik, Crown Prince of Denmark. As Tom explained it, Mary took her opportunity to meet Fred in a Sydney pub, not knowing she would soon be the star in a fairytale romance between prince and commoner.

Rudolph Wirawan continued the theme of opportunity knocks in Table Topics.

He began by asking **Tom** Woods what advice he would give his 12 year old self, if he had the opportunity to do so. Tom explained it would not be to brush his hair because, as Tom found, it doesn't always get thicker.



David Griffith explained what he would do if opportunity doesn't knock. With his military background, he said he wouldn't wait and gave us the memorable phrase: go straight down the middle with bags of smoke. Which means: go for it.

Our Toastmaster for the evening, Linda Said, was well-prepared and did her usual professional job when introducing our five speakers. Once again, all speeches were interesting and entertaining.
